## The New Tax Law and Its Effects on Your Tuition

The new tax plan signed into law on December 22, 2017, could be a big help to parents with children in a private school.

If you have older children as I do, we began to make deposits into a 529 College Savings Plan for each of our children to help us pay for college expenses. We started this plan when our children were very young and have made small deposits along the way. While we could not set aside a lot of money to save for college, we were able to do something that helped with a year or two when our children became college age. The beauty of the 529 Plan is that you are allowed to withdraw money, as little or as much as you wish, to pay for college tuition, room and board, books or supplies for schooling.



The new tax plan enables parents to create new or utilize old existing 529 plans to withdraw up to \$10,000 per year for K-12 private school tuition. This is

completely new! The tax break comes as the money compounds. You are not taxed on any increase realized, nor are you taxed on money being pulled out to pay for private school tuition. This is where the savings takes place. While this is just an incentive, it could be quite beneficial for our families.



In Minnesota there is a new tax credit on deposits to 529 Plans as well. While there are gross income limits, and the credit is small, we do recommend that if you currently have a 529 Plan for your children that you ask your tax accountant about this credit when doing your taxes this year.

You may also want to talk to them about the potential help a 529 Plan might be in saving some money on your private school tuition.

Not all of the regulations are defined yet for MN plans, but we should know more soon and will forward that to you as soon as we receive more information.

In the meantime, please ask the person doing your taxes about 529 Plans to pay for private school tuition and tax credits if you currently have a 529 Plan.

# Katriel Ng is a National Merit Scholarship Program Finalist

Mr. Alan J. Hodak, Administrator of Fourth Baptist Christian School, announces that Katriel Ng has been named a Finalist in the 2018 National Merit Scholarship Program. This is a very high honor, that only a select few of our students have achieved.

FBCS students take the PSAT/ NMSQT (National Merit Scholarship Qualification Test) their sophomore

year for practice, and then take it again their junior year to participate in this scholarship program.

Of the 1.5 million students who take the PSAT test their junior

year, a student who scores high enough to become a finalist means they are ranked as one of the top 15,000 students nationally, or in the top 1% in the nation.

The steps of the program are these: 1). The student takes the PSAT their junior year. 2). If a student scores high enough to become a semi-finalist, the student is required to take the SAT to verify their test score, and write an essay on a given topic. Katriel's essay title was *Extraordinary Comes From Being Extra-ordinary*. 3). If chosen to be a finalist, the student has a 50% chance of receiving an academic scholarship from the foundation behind the National Merit Scholarship Program.

Many colleges will also offer their own scholarships based on a student being a finalist in the National Merit Scholarship Program, and based on that, Katriel should expect to receive a substantial academic scholarship wherever she attends college.

We congratulate FBCS Senior, Katriel Ng, and wish her all God's best in her college career in her chosen field of study, which at this moment is biomedical engineering. ◆
