

A Few Thoughts About Social Justice

In our culture today, we are hearing more and more about social justice. What is social justice? Is there a real movement in our culture and are we seeing it in our public school system? The answer to both questions is "yes," but the problem is that the definition of the term is complicated and confusing. I would guess that if we were to ask people on the street to define the term, we would get a number of different answers. So let's try to define the term based on what we are hearing and reading.

The definition of social justice is as follows: "It is a political and philosophical concept which holds that all people should have equal access to wealth, health, well-being, justice, and opportunity" (Investopedia). Cultural examples of social injustice would include discrimination issues, ageism (prejudice or discrimination based on a person's age), and homophobia (dislike prejudice against homosexual or people) and could be expanded to include unfair labor practices, racial discrimination, gender discrimination, gender orientation, and ethnicity.

Because so many public school districts are going to a social justice curriculum, elements of the curriculum design for many elementary programs include six basic elements that are intertwined into all aspects of the curriculum. These would include (and are not necessarily limited to) 1. Self-love and Knowledge, 2. Respect for Others; 3. Issues of Social Injustice; 4. Social Movements and Social Change;

5. Awareness Raising; 6. Social Action (Picower, pp. 4-5).

Before I go on, I want to stop for a moment and share something that I recently taught in chapel. Satan is the father of lies. When he deceived Eve in the Garden, he lied to her - Satan told her that if she ate of the forbidden fruit, she would not die (Genesis 3:4). The truth is that she would physically die as a result of her disobedience to She would have lived in an God. eternal state, from that time forward, in sweet fellowship with God. But because of her sin, and that of her husband, the consequences of the curse of sin directly affected them and all who came after. Adam and Eve did die a physical death (one of a number of consequences to their sin). But there was an element of truth involved which aided Satan in his deception. In many of our world philosophies, there is an element of truth and we must be discerning about it. Is it truth, according to the Word of God, or is it shrouded in deception and lies? But the problem with social justice is how far away from the truth it can be taken, what is taught to be truth, and where it will lead our young people and ultimately our culture.

The Christian culture we have known (as adults) all our lives is no longer the worldview we find in our school systems. In fact, we are hardpressed to find it anywhere in our government-run institutions. 
and the social justice ideology is directly being taught to our children from preschool age and up.

If we take only the first of the six elements, "Self-love and knowledge," just how far does social justice take this idea? One writer defended this element as teaching a child all about his racial or ethnic identity, learning about his historical background, and a desire to develop a pride in his culture. I applaud this activity at face-value. I want my children to be proud of their heritage and ancestry, but I also want them to know that God has created them just the way they are, for a special purpose and to fulfill His

plan for them. The experiences they have gone through and the things that they will learn will shape their future in such a way where God can use them for His purposes and His glory. They find their value not just in their heritage and ethnicity, but in who God made them to be. He loves them and their love is to be centered on Him and others, not on themselves.

So, just how far can we take the concept of self-love and knowledge? When God is not a part of the equation, we can take it pretty far. Consider an article by Michael Novak, entitled, "Social Justice, Not What You Think It Is." In order to equalize fairness, the privileged ones of this world (those who are educated, have degrees, are working, and are making a fair wage) have the advantage over those who do not. In fact, "the privileged of this world have a chance to control births and control the number of children they have, but the poor do not and that's not fair" (Novak, p. 6). So, in the name of the poor, progressive social justice thinkers, who believe in self-love and knowledge, would include the concept of reproductive rights into the social justice train of thought. Consequently, the underprivileged woman should be able to have an abortion because she does not have access to the same things that the wealthier woman has access to. This is taking self-love way too far!

The truth of the matter, unfortunately, is that social justice is at the heart of socialism. "Is it any wonder that among millennials (young adults between 18-29 years old), 51% are in favor of socialism?"

This is one of the reasons that we are getting so many inquiries into our Christian school. Parents are struggling with what they are beginning to see and hear from their children regarding their education in the public school. Repeatedly, parents say, "We want better for our children!"

We are a culture struggling between multiple ideologies. Families are attempting to cling to the truth of God's Word and are fleeing from a system where God is not welcomed. Social justice ideology is spreading. As it continues to spread, so will the numbers who will attempt to flee from it.

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
