

#### **Religious Liberty: Conviction, Indifference, or Intolerance?** by Mr. Alan J. Hodak

The Religious Freedom and Restoration Act (RFRA) was passed by the 103<sup>rd</sup> Conaress by an overwhelmina majority vote 97-3 in the United States Senate in 1993-94. The Senate bill was written by Democratic Senator, Chuck Schumer, from New York and one of manv House co-sponsors was Representative Nancy Pelosi (D-CA). The Senate, that year, was made up of 54 Democrats and 46 Republicans. The bill was passed on to President Bill Clinton and signed into law. RFRA was written to protect the "free exercise of religion" in our country and protect U.S. citizens from government prohibitions regarding the exercise of personal religious beliefs and demanded the least of restrictive means of furthering government aovernment fundina interest in exemptions. Since then, the law has served to protect American citizens from bills passed by Congress and signed by the President in matters of religious liberty.

On my recent trip to Washington, D.C., I represented our



state Christian school association at the American Association of Christian Schools (AACS) Legislative Conference. We met to discuss and lobby any issue which affects private education. This year, we have had great concern about H.R. 5, "The Equality Act," passed by a majority vote in the U.S. House of

Representatives. On the surface, the Equality Act sounds good, but reading the bill causes great concern. In section two of the bill, one will find some 20 points of "Findings" from the author. The "Findings" detail discrimination of various types as it affects sex identified discrimination primarily against lesbian. bisexual. gay, (LGBTQ+ transgender people highlighted in 16 of the 20 findings) and only mentions discrimination against women one time. The target of the bill is to modify the Civil Rights Act of 1964. If passed, the bill will repeal any claim RFRA may have and removes any basis for challenging the enforcement of this bill (see Section 1107). In what appears to be an effort to silence the religious right, the potential effects of this bill toward religious institutions appears inevitable. The bill could affect religious school hiring practices, admissions policies, ministry counseling, and a multiplicity of other potential issues. This effort is a direct attack against the civil liberties of Americans who love God and desire to live out their faith all in the name of discrimination.

Thankfully, the slightly rightleaning Senate will not hear this bill during the current session and most likely will table it. President Trump has stated he would not sign the bill into law. My goal, in our lobbying effort, was to speak to several of our state Representatives' aides to explain clearly our position against this bill and its potential damage to Christian education and religious liberty in general. My argument was simple: why would we pass a law that would attempt to remove the religious rights of the *(Continued on page 2)*

greater populace when every citizen has the freedom to choose to worship or choose to follow the religion or belief of their choice? Religious freedom is foundational in American history and was given to us by our Founders and has been defended throughout our American history.

Furthermore, this bill is bad for women's rights, an imposition upon the greater population with regard to restroom usage in public places. In addition, many of our governmentrun schools are already forcing the indoctrination of this view. What happened to the individual's right to live out his or her religious beliefs in the public sector without government prohibitions?

I spent a very hot and humid morning in D.C. visiting three of our Representatives' offices. I had the privilege of meeting with a number of staff members from three Representatives: Congressman Jim Hagedorn (R-1<sup>st</sup> District-First Baptist, New Ulm, Victory Chr. Rochester, Owatonna Christian, Oakland Baptist, Grace Christian Mankato), Congressman Collin Peterson (D-7<sup>th</sup> District-Heritage Christian Karlstad, FHL Academy-Bagley), and Congressman Dean Phillips (D-3<sup>rd</sup> District -Fourth Baptist, Coon Rapids Christian School, Bethany Christian Academy – Brooklyn Park).

My first stop was to Mr. Hagedorn's office where I spoke with his educational aide, a young man who was

passionate about religious freedom. He knew all the in's and out's of "The Equality Act" and gave me some good advice as I would be meeting with two Congressmen that I did not believe would be receptive to what I had to say. I would like to refer to this Congressman as a man of "conviction."

My next meeting was with the office of Representative Collin Peterson (D-7<sup>th</sup> District). His aide was quite as knowledgeable about the bill and informed me that the Congressman did not vote for H.R. 5. Unfortunately, he did not vote at all, he abstained. His aide explained that while he was in favor of equal rights, he would not vote for a bill that did not guarantee religious liberty. In fact, his aide communicated a strong position regarding religious freedom. We spoke for some time about the potential ramifications of this bill, and she assured me that his position would remain firm. However, he would not take a public stand and for this. I would like to label this Representative as a man of "indifference."

My third meeting was with an aide from our Congressman from the 3<sup>rd</sup> district, Representative Dean Phillips. I was grateful that his aide was willing to take the time to talk to me. This young aide had attended a private religious school in the Minneapolis area, understood our frame of reference, but became confused regarding the responsibility of education. Was it the parents? Was it the children's choice? Was the state responsible to legislate morality?

All are questions the liberal left are struggling to

About 34,000 Commended Students throughout the nation are being recognized for their exceptional academic promise. Although they will not continue in the 2020 competition for National merit Scholarship awards, Commended Students placed amount the top 50,000 scorers of more than 1.5 million students who entered the 2020 competition by taking the 2018 Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT®).

"Those being named Commended Students have demonstrated outstanding potential for academic success," commented a spokesperson for NMSC. "These students represent a valuable national resource; recognizing their accomplishments. As well as the key role their schools play in their academic development, is vital to the advancement of educational excellence in our nation. We hope that this recognition will help broadened their educational opportunities and encourage them as they continue their pursuit of academic success."

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Aaron's PSAT score was among the top 1% in the nation. Because the program chooses a certain number of students per state in order to have a broader cross section of students among the semi-finalists, Aaron, being a student in Minnesota a high academic-achieving state—just missed the cut-off for semi-finalists. Had he been in another state, Arizona, for example, his score would have placed him among the program semi-finalists. Aaron plans to attend Bob Jones University in Greenville, SC this fall.

understand. I explained that parents choose our school based on our Biblical philosophy, which agrees with what our families desire for their children to learn. But many parents are also desiring to protect their children from what the public school is currently teaching. I further explained that people are fleeing public education in large numbers and that the private schools in the Congressman's district are growing and enrolling thousands of students. God has given our children to us. My five daughters were not given to the state to raise and educate. They were given to my wife and me. Every person, in the United States, regardless of conviction, has the right to choose a school to attend. Every person has the right to attend church. Religious freedom mandates a freedom to choose. If that freedom is taken away, then the government will be able to legislate morality in education. For some 57 million students who attend our government-run public schools, the social justice worldview will predominate. God help us! Unfortunately, I don't think I won a convert to my position from Representative Phillip's office. I would like, then, to refer to this Congressman's position as one of "intolerance."

When a Congressman is elected to office, he hires an army of dozens of workers to progress his agenda. The same is true of the office of President, but in the Executive branch, the President hires on thousands who push forth his agenda. So, when we put people in positions of power over us, we release armies of workers who are or are not sympathetic with our views. Please remember this when you vote in the next election. We lose or win based on the hundreds and hundreds of legislative aides who push through agendas and laws. We must be very careful about who we elect and ultimately what we protect.

The exercise of visiting the Representatives' offices in Washington, D.C., that day, gave me a perspective of our nation's position regarding religious liberty. Will our nation exercise conviction on the issue of religious liberty? Will it exercise indifference? Or will it exercise intolerance? The Representatives that we have voted into office are giving us a glimpse of our future.

How will we then respond? With conviction? With indifference? With intolerance? The choice is up to you!

#### Science in Action: The BJU Science Ambassadors Visit FBCS in October

Dr. George and wife, Darlene, visited us in mid-October for a series of science presentations for our grades 7–12 students. Dr. Matzko holds a B.S. in Chemistry from BJU, and a Ph.D. in Analytical Chemistry from Clemson University. Dr. Matzko was a member and chair of the BJU science faculty for many years until his retirement from the classroom in May of 2018. This fall, he began his next career as a BJU Science Ambassador, traveling to churches and Christian Schools. His website states: *"It's not science vs. scripture, but science in scripture that glorifies our Lord Jesus Christ and honors Him as the Creator."* 

Dr. & Mrs. Matzko introduced students to six "Christian Pioneers of Science" through a non-stop variety of hands-on demonstrations. Lord Kelvin, Robert Boyle, Phillip Henry Gosse, Johannes Kepler, James Clerk Maxwell, and Michael Faraday were Christian scientists and founders of scientific disciplines from thermodynamics and chemistry to marine biology, astronomy and electromagnetism.

While learning about each of these men and their contributions to science, we witnessed Bernoulli's principle by balancing balls in the air stream of a blow dryer, saw the effects of steam crush a soda can, watched a Cartesian diver

float and sink with changes in atmospheric pressure, were surprised when water poured down a string, and had fun watching light refraction sparkle off diamonds and make test tubes disappear in vegetable oil.

The favorite demonstration of the week was experiencing water's protective high capacity of heat by having our hands set on fire! Now, that's my kind of hands-on learning! - *L. Mendoza*










# Varsity Soccer Season Wrap-Up














### JV Volleyball Team
