The Façade of the Building Has Changed, but the Foundation Stands

I love studying and reading about history! I especially love studying about the history of our nation, its Founders, and some of the special stories that highlight our heritage. I was recently asked to review a book on the Bible and its impact on our early history. An excerpt from the Great Awakening (1725-1775) caught my interest.

During a period of about thirty years, the American colonies experienced a spiritual revival unlike any other. Jonathan Edwards and George Whitefield were mentioned as key figures. Having limited knowledge about these men, I decided to do further study. I did some research on Jonathan Edwards, a fascinating character. I remembered that in one of my literature courses in secular college, we read many of his writings. One memorable reading was his sermon, Sinners in the Hands of an Angry God. As I studied a bit more about his life, I found out that at the age of 13, Edwards entered Yale College and graduated from their School of Divinity. After rededicating his life to full-time service to our Lord, Edwards eventually worked under the tutelage of his grandfather, and upon his grandfather's death, took over his grandfather's church. He served there for twenty years.

His preaching was convicting as he brought the issue of sin to the forefront. Edwards always stressed a person's need to be saved. Once he established that the unregenerate in the audience were surely on their way to hell because of their sin, he would then present the clear plan of salvation. Thousands were saved because of the truth of this message.

Yale kept coming back to mind as I further examined Edwards' life. From information I read on the web, I studied Yale University, Harvard University, and Princeton. I did not find out much about the history of each college, but I did find out that many of our early founders and leaders graduated from these institutions. Institutions which, at that time, taught God's Word and trained most of our great theologians and ministers of that day.



What I found in digging a bit further, was that the idea of the university was a Christian invention. The classical Christian university, from the medieval universities to the early American colleges, were organized around three branches of knowledge: the "natural sciences," the knowledge of the external world—including both empirical science and philosophical reflection on objective truth; the "moral sciences," the knowledge of human beings and how they should live—covering such fields as history, the

humanities, and law; and the "theological sciences," knowledge of God to be gained from studying Scripture, theology, and the Christian life (Veith).

During the Great Awakening, theology was considered to be the basis—the foundation—by which all other truth was derived. Since God held together the foundation and everything else was built upon it, early universities used a strong biblical foundation in teaching all subjects.

Obviously, things have changed over time. I graduated from a secular university that had its roots in the teaching of education. The Bible was taught there as well, in its early years, as in most secular schools of that day. As a Christian, I am embarrassed by many things that have come out of that college today, but I can remember sitting in the class, *Biblical Backgrounds of Literature*, in which I was taught fallacies with regard to the Bible. I was a new Christian at the time and I remember, with limited knowledge of the Word, arguing with the professor because he attacked the very foundational truths that I had learned from my pastor. My professor had his theories and I had the truth of the Word of God.

The impact of our universities on academia is far reaching. Most of the Baby Boomers (my generation—I'm dating myself) experienced Bible teaching and prayer in the public school



they attended as elementary students. Today, objective truth has been thrown out the window to allow for incredibly twisted ways of looking at our world. Add to this the liberal political educational agenda that our culture is being forced to learn, and the outcome now is that "universities once devoted to the pursuit of truth are, ironically, the very institutions that are denying there is any such thing" (Veith).

We are seeing today in our Christian colleges and many churches, that doctrine and biblical principles are no longer clearly stated. These issues are up for discussion and debate, and multiple views are accepted. The prevalent tendency of our culture is to stray far away from our biblical heritage. What has happened to schools like Yale, Harvard, and Princeton could very well happen to many churches and Christian schools in our day. Satan is busy causing confusion



and spreading lies about the truth of the Word of God.

The ministry of our school, and schools like ours, is serving a critical role in the education of our children. Despite the outcome of elections and the various popular trends of our nation and culture, God's Word will continue to flourish in the minds and hearts of the people who are open and willing to receive it. We must never minimize the importance of a Christian education and we must prioritize the inclusion of the Word of God in our everyday lives.

God's people, who are surrendered to God's Word and filled with God's Spirit, will yield the fruit of the Spirit in the eyes of a needy world that is desperately looking for answers. Only God's Word has the answers. Your children, equipped with a biblical education received from their home, church and school, will be the ones who carry on the biblical heritage of our nation.

The façade of the building will continue to change and look different from generation to generation, but the solid foundation of God's Word will always stand.

Grandparents & Parents Day 2022


