



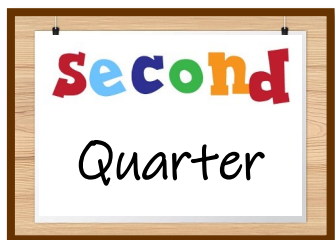

Honoring Miss Mary Wickham: 40 Years of Faithful Service to FBCS

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Our Mission

Fourth Baptist Christian School, as a ministry of Fourth Baptist Church, is committed to the development of a student's spiritual life in Jesus Christ, while pursuing academic excellence in a manner which honors and glorifies God, based on the only infallible Word, the Bible.

The Bible tells us that if we are a believer in Jesus Christ, there will be a day coming, according to 1 Cor. 15:51-52, that we, the church, will rise to be with Jesus Christ in the air. It will happen in a moment of time, in a twinkling of the eye. It is said that those who have died in Jesus will rise first and then we, who are alive, will be changed instantly and we will meet the Lord Jesus in the air. Because of these truths, this, for the church, will be the final victory over death and sin. This event, which we believe is the rapture of the church, could happen today, tomorrow, or fifty years from now. We do not know God's timetable, but we are told the following:

"Therefore, my beloved brethren, be (to become, calls for a constant attitude and action) steadfast and immovable (seated firmly, resolved, not able to moved from its place), always abounding (excelling, to super abound, to be in abundance) in the work of the Lord, knowing that your labor (effort, toil, every act, literally pains) is not in vain (or empty) in the Lord." 1 Cor. 15:58

My very first year at FBCS was in the fall of 2010 and the school was struggling. Enrollment had significantly dropped and I was hired to attempt to rebuild our program and make sure that we could make it financially. In attempting to put a plan together, we had to make some significant cuts to our office staff and to our high school teaching staff. Our office staff was cut down to Miss Mary as our full-time school secretary

and me. Mrs. French was hired on to help us, but was part-time, which meant that most of the responsibilities had to fall on Miss Mary and myself. We started with an enrollment much higher than we had forecasted and Miss Mary had to learn the old grading system called SFA. Mr. Hazard came back to train Miss Mary on that system and it was up to us to make sure the office ran well.



What I remember most about Miss Mary was that she was the face of FBCS. She knew the people and their names and when alumni would drop in, she would remember their names as well, get out their file and show them their student pictures. She was forever serving as a student nurse, answering phones, and helping people with questions they might have. Many of our alumni would have had Miss Mary help them in getting a

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cough drop, calling home, or taking their temperature if they did not feel well. I will tell you that we couldn't have made it without Miss Mary in those early years as she worked tirelessly and often late into the evening to make sure things were done well. She was one of the most faithful and dedicated employees I have ever had work for me. She demonstrated a spirit of steadfastness, always abounding in the work of the Lord at this place, and labored on our behalf. Those were difficult days without a lot of "thank you's." We had to put our nose to the grindstone and Miss Mary did, with the right attitude. And... she super-abounded, never giving up, and remaining firm on her conviction of Christian education and making sure our office was a professional place. There are a number of things that I want our young people (and all of us)



to learn regarding the remarkable testimony of Miss Mary:

1. We need to be people who "Be." We become people who have a consistent positive attitude of action. We are joyful and not walking around with a frown.
2. We need to be people of resolve – people who are seated firmly; people who are immovable. We are set in our convictions. For Miss Mary it was a conviction of Christian education and ministering to our students and parents all these years and making sure our school ran well.
3. We need to be people who excel at what we do and super abound at it. A Christian should never do things half-way. He or she should strive to do their best, to reach their highest potential, to set the bar high, not settle for just good enough to get by.
4. We need to be people who are willing to labor – even when folks are not grateful. There are times when you have to turn up the heat – and your work is labor – it is



toil. It's not always going to be easy. When you are called to step it up in life, those who understand the importance of laboring, do it and they don't quit.

5. When times are hard, we tend to think that our labor is not valuable. But Miss Mary never thought that. She always continued to work hard in a consistent manner.

These lessons, from 1 Cor. 15:58, were important things that Miss Mary exemplified for us.

But there is another characteristic that comes out in Miss Mary and that is one of perseverance. She served in our ministry from 1983 until this year. This will make her service to our school 40 years! For the first year, Miss Mary was hired to be the church secretary, but over the summer, the school needed a secretary and Miss Mary was called upon to do the work. It is seldom seen that a person serves in one place for that long. In the 1984-85 school year, our school enrollment was 632 students at the old building on Fremont. She served a number of years there as well as the interim locations while our current facility was being built, and of course, at our present

Her influence, kindness, and example has touched many, many lives over the years. In addition, she worked under four administrators: Mr. Dan Bjokne, Mr. Steve Seidler, Mr. Jon Tuttle, and me. She served when the school had its highest enrollment of 633 students in 1985, and the lowest in 2009 (193).

One of the things that I have appreciated about Miss Mary is that she could be trusted. This is also a rare thing, young people. A private conversation remained that way. I learned early on that I could talk to her about a struggle, get some advice, and know that it would remain between the two of us. I am so grateful to Miss Mary for that.

It is also important to remember someone who was very consistent in her work ethic and character. Miss Mary tried, very hard, to demonstrate a consistent manner of life before all of us and we noticed that in her. She always showed up! I remember only a time or two in 13 years where she was too sick to come to work. So many valuable lessons of perseverance, consistent work ethic, Christ-like example, the face of the school, and a love for people, parents and students.

God blessed us with Miss Mary for many years with a godly example. Thank you, Miss Mary, for your faithful service to FBCS! Miss Mary Wickham officially retired on December 16, 2022. We wish her all the best in her retirement years!
