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Our Mission

Minnesota Legislation Update: Christian College PSEO Programs

A companion bill in the Minnesota House and Senate addresses Christian colleges and PSEO programs in our state. This is part of the many changes in education policy brought on by Governor Walz and the DFL controlled House and Senate. HF-1269 and SF-1311 include language that has been added to the policy. On lines 19.8 and 19.11, both bills read as follows: "An eligible institution must not require a faith statement during the application process or base any part of the admission decision on a student's race, creed, ethnicity, disability, gender, or sexual orientation, or religious beliefs or affiliations." This language will disallow funding for Christian college programs that require students to sign a faith statement in order to be accepted and attend these programs.

An example of an eligible institution is the University of Northwestern, St. Paul and other area Christian colleges in our state. Students have enjoyed the privilege of attending these schools in their junior and senior years and receiving free college tuition in order to take advantage of the state funding for post-secondary education. FBCS, and many schools in our association, has created "Honors" programs which allow our students the ability to work on-line and receive dual credit in order to get a jump start on earning college credits during the junior and senior years of high school. "We have chosen to not offer AP courses because there is no guarantee of earning credit if the final tests are not passed," said Mr. Hodak, Administrator of Fourth Baptist Christian School. "When we take college courses from an institution like the University of Northwestern, St. Paul, our students pass the courses and earn college credits. They also receive a college transcript from Northwestern, a regionally accredited university."



Many have panicked over the language of this bill, but it will not affect Northwestern's ability to administer their on-line PSEO program because no faith statement is required to be signed to take their on-line coursework. This new stipulation, if passed, will not change our school's ability to take their courses, but it will affect the university's ability to offer their on-site program to students desiring to attend Northwestern early and remain there for their final two years of college. This will indirectly affect the



bottom line for Northwestern and could have an effect on their overall PSEO program. Our students have benefited from Northwestern's commitment to excellence and we are grateful for their excellent on-line course offerings.

A few weeks back, I sent an email to our MACS schools' administrators and pastors to share with each of their



constituents and take some action in writing, calling, or emailing each state Representative and Senator to eliminate this added language in these two bills. The current legislature seems to be dead set on changing much of the educational policy that our state has known for decades. There is no question that as we watch new attempts being made to change the face of education policy in Minnesota, the trickle-down effects will eventually reach into private education.

We must be diligent to let our opinions be made known, writing and calling our officials to let them know where we stand. Should we remain silent, we will see new attempts at government overreach into the private school realm. I can only implore you to pay attention to these things in the coming months and years. I have been told that by this coming summer, we will no longer recognize education policy in Minnesota.

Please remember these things when the next election cycle comes and become involved in electing conservative Representatives and Senators in your respective districts. ~Mr. Alan J. Hodak

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What are the Benefits of CLEP Testing?

College Level Examination Program (CLEP) is an option for high school students to demonstrate their knowledge in

various subjects and earn college credits. To assist students in this program, Fourth Baptist Christian School offers CLEP testing in our computer lab. CLEP testing offers numerous benefits to high school students, including cost savings, accelerated graduation, and enhanced college applications.

One of the primary benefits of CLEP testing for high school students is cost savings. According to the College Board, which administers CLEP exams, the average cost of tuition and fees for a four-year degree at a public university is around \$10,560 per year. By earning college credits through CLEP testing, students can potentially save thousands of dollars in tuition costs. Moreover, given the high cost of higher education, CLEP testing can enable access to higher education to students who otherwise may not have been able to afford a college education.

Additionally, CLEP testing can help students graduate college more quickly. According to the College Board, students who earn 15 credits through CLEP testing can graduate an average of one semester earlier than their

peers who do not. This means that CLEP testing can provide high school students with a pathway to enter the workforce or graduate school sooner and begin pursuing their career goals.

Furthermore, CLEP testing can also help high school students stand out on college applications. According to the National Association of College Admission Counseling, 84% of colleges and universities consider CLEP credits in their admissions process. This means that earning CLEP credits can demonstrate to college admissions officers that a student is motivated, dedicated, and has a strong understanding of various subjects.

Since CLEP testing can be a valuable tool for high school students, FBCS has become a certified CLEP Testing Center, open to our students as well as the public. JV Boys Basketball


