Why Christian Education? Part 3

Continuing the discussion from previous newsletters, let's resume by focusing on why Christian education is incredibly valuable, especially today. We've seen its foundation here in America, and how that foundation was built on three concepts, derived from Deuteronomy 6:6-9; (1) keep the words, (2) teach the words, and (3) review the words and works with your families. Moses' insistence on this, from the commands and statutes of God, formed the basis for Christian teaching and learning throughout centuries.

Please allow me to continue this conversation focusing on two components of Christian education: character development and community/spiritual fellowship. As we navigate the corridors of Fourth Baptist Christian School, these aspects stand out prominently as foundational pillars of our educational philosophy, molding not only academic achievers, but also nurturing compassionate leaders rooted in faith.

CHARACTER DEVELOPMENT AND MORAL FOUNDATION

At Fourth Baptist Christian School, our approach to character development and moral formation is deeply rooted in our choice of educational resources, including textbooks from Abeka and BJU Press. These renowned publishers are known for their commitment to integrating biblical principles seamlessly into academic content, creating a cohesive learning experience that fosters spiritual growth and ethical awareness.

One of the key strengths of both publishers is their emphasis on teaching from a biblical worldview. From history and science to literature and mathematics, these textbooks not only present facts and concepts but also frame them within the context of God's truth and moral teachings. This holistic approach ensures that students not only acquire knowledge but also develop a strong foundation of values that align with Christian principles.

Having Christian textbooks does not make us a Christian school, though; neither does it provide the full breadth of training your student deserves and that you have requested. Our teachers, as mature believers in Christ, complement our textbooks which offer structured lessons and activities that promote reflection, critical thinking, and



decision-making based on biblical principles. Whether exploring ethical dilemmas, analyzing historical events through a moral lens, or engaging in discussions about contemporary issues from a Christian perspective, students are equipped with the tools to navigate complex moral terrain with wisdom and discernment.

This process happens at an age-appropriate pace. Through engaging stories, historical accounts, and real-life applications, students are encouraged to emulate positive role models from Scripture and history, learning valuable lessons about character and moral conduct. We are not placing difficult scenarios or complex biblical characters and storylines in front of your students before they are able to handle such discussions.

By incorporating textbooks from Abeka and BJU Press into our curriculum, we ensure that our students receive a comprehensive education that not only prepares them academically but also shapes them into individuals of strong character, integrity, and moral conviction. It is through these educational resources that we strive to fulfill our mission of



nurturing students who not only excel in their studies but also exemplify the values of the Christian faith in their daily lives.

COMMUNITY AND SPIRITUAL FELLOWSHIP

Now that we've explored the importance of character development and moral foundation, let's shift our focus to another vital aspect of our school's philosophy—community and spiritual fellowship. Just as each student's growth is nurtured through values and integrity, our collective strength as a school community is fueled by shared faith and a sense of belonging.

The focal point of each week is the chapel service—an opportunity for three separate segments of our student body to sing, share, and hear God's Word. The chapel program is broken up into three segments: preschool (K4)—2nd grade, 3rd—6th grade, and 7th—12th grade.

Both the elementary and secondary chapels follow a theme, or variations on a theme. For the elementary chapels this year, Mrs. Fure is walking students through the various Old Testament heroes and comparing them to modern-day superheroes. Those comparisons include Noah and Superman (who both helped save mankind), Jacob and Loki (who were both deceivers) and even Samson and The Hulk (who both possessed superhuman strength). The goal of these comparisons is to teach faith in God through stories of real people who did extraordinary things. Relating superheroes to Bible characters is a fun way to draw attention to God by placing emphasis on His superiority to us all.

The secondary students have worked through the book of Nehemiah, learning that Hard Work + Prayer + Unshakeable Faith = Successful Problem-Solving. Along the way, the students have also been challenged as to the role of the Word of God in their lives: is God's Word important? Are they growing? Throughout the study, students have seen how Nehemiah's faith has grown despite, or possibly because of, the external and internal challenges he faced.

All students have Bible class daily, with the exception of junior and senior Honors students taking college-level Bible classes three times weekly. It's in these classes that students are continually presented

with the people of God's Word, the challenges they faced, and the outcome of their decisions. Each Bible story and narrative are given as an example or pattern (1 Cor 10:11), encouraging and admonishing us all in our walk with God. As we lay these in front of our students, the challenge is for them to choose to follow Christ and walk in His steps.

Finally, FBCS faculty are encouraged to invest in the lives of our students. While most students struggle to relate to every teacher, most students would identify one or two staff members who invested directly into their life through building relationships, providing mentorship and guidance, and even promoting personal growth.

CONCLUSION

As we conclude our exploration of character development, moral foundation, community, and spiritual fellowship in Christian education, it's clear that these aspects are not just lessons learned but values lived. They form the backbone of our school's philosophy and contribute to the holistic growth of our students.

From instilling virtues like integrity and compassion to fostering a sense of belonging and shared purpose, our commitment to character and community shapes the fabric of our school community. It's not just about what we teach in the classroom but how we live out these values in our interactions, service projects, and everyday actions.




