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Funding Fourth Baptist Christian School

Have you ever wondered how Fourth Baptist Christian School is funded? Obviously, those of you who make regular tuition payments have a pretty good idea, but the answer does have several facets to it. Our salaries and everyday expenses are funded almost entirely by the tuition our families pay to attend FBCS. We don't receive government funds, even though there are some available to private schools in Minnesota. We believe that autonomous decision making according to our convictions outweighs the limited potential help of government funding. At this time, we also do not do significant fundraising towards our annual budget. This being the case, we rely on the payments of our constituent families and the real sacrifices that they make to have their kids here. This sacrifice is not lost on us.

In keeping our expenses down, we do receive significant help from Fourth Baptist Church. The church helps carry many of the overhead costs of running the organization. Things like utilities and custodial services are subsidized through the generosity of Fourth Baptist Church. We are grateful for this partnership and we are grateful for God's sustaining provision of our organization.

But what about expenses or projects outside the normal flow of the budget? How can we help families who might need some extra assistance? How can we continue to improve our facilities and programs? For these things, we are dependent on additional donations. If God would so move you to help us out, there are a couple of ways that you can help advance the mission of FBCS.

The first way is through the Karen Burns Memorial Scholarship Fund. Karen Burns was the long-time art teacher at FBCS. After her death in 2010, a scholarship fund was established in her memory. This fund has grown into a healthy balance which is allowing us to fund annual scholarship assistance through interest and market gains. Still, less than



a third of the scholarships we gave out this year were covered in this way. There is still much room for growth.

Another way that you can support the mission and future efforts of FBCS is through our new Special Projects Fund. This is a fund that we have launched to fund improvements and upgrades to our facility and programs. This Special Projects Fund will be used in a number of ways. Each summer, we spend a significant amount of money upgrading our technology. This past summer, we purchased five new interactive Smart TV's which were placed in Classrooms. These are replacing our aging interactive projectors, and have worked really well for our teachers. We anticipate purchasing five or more of these each

Dr. Roberto Coelho

I was born in Minneapolis, Minnesota in 1976, while my father was attending Central Baptist Theological Seminary. At the age of three, my family returned to Brazil, where my father has served as a national pastor and church planting missionary. I had the privilege of being involved early on in the ministry in the areas of music, youth, and evangelism.

In 1994, I started attending the University of São Paulo, where I graduated in 1997 with a double major in English and Portuguese. In 1998, I completed my teaching Licensure Degree at the University of São Paulo. In 1998, I married

Patricia, the very first convert of my father's church planting ministry in São Paulo. She was saved at the age of 14, having come from a Catholic background.

Shortly after we got married, we moved to Minnesota in order to attend Central Baptist Theological Seminary. We became members of Fourth Baptist Church in Plymouth and I worked at FedEx while in seminary. I graduated from Central Seminary in 2002 with a Master of Divinity (M.Div.).

During our seminary training, the Lord burdened us to go back to Brazil as church planting missionaries. In October of 2002, we applied to Baptist World Mission of Decatur, Alabama. I was commissioned and ordained by Fourth Baptist Church in 2005. We arrived back in Brazil in 2005 to begin our ministry.

We began our church plant in the western section of São Paulo in 2006. We completed the church planting ministry of Faith Baptist Church in Cotia, and have turned the ministry over to a national pastor.

In 2021, I was able to complete the Doctor of Ministry (D.Min.) degree at Central Seminary. I plan to continue teaching in seminaries as the Lord opens doors to address the great need of training national pastors. During our ministry in Brazil, I have been involved in teaching modular classes in several seminaries throughout Brazil, both in the college and master level.

The Lord has blessed us with three kids. Samuel is 16, Sophia is 14, and Isabella is 13. We praise the Lord that all three of our children have placed their faith in Jesus Christ.

Our desire is to obey the Great Commission in making disciples of Jesus Christ through evangelism, discipleship, and the training of nationals. I plan to be involved in teaching and in church planting when we return to São Paulo.

I am currently back in the U.S. on furlough, reporting to our supporting churches and teaching two Bible classes at Fourth Baptist Christian School. I continue to assist the ministry of Faith Baptist Church in São Paulo. ■ ~ *Dr. Roberto Coelho*

Gale Woods Farm



Grandparents' & Parents' Day 2025



songs and stories of faith. Grandparents were loved, giants were slain, and of course the cute Kindergartners stole the show.


